Private, members-only racquet club is rising fast near West Palm

- The club aims to provide a family-friendly, off-screen social environment for the growing local population.

The Court Club, a private [club focused on racquet sports](#), is rising fast in the greater West Palm Beach area.

Also rising: the club's membership roster.

Already there are 100 founding families. Organizers now are looking to select more members from the whopping 700-applicant wait list.

The club is being built at 1591 Kirk Road in the village of Palm Springs. The site is just south of [Trump International Golf Club](#).

When complete, this [private membership club](#) will feature six padel courts, six tennis courts and two or more pickleball courts, according to Ned Grace, co-founder and managing partner of NDT Development, one of the project's partners.

Site work first began in January, and the foundation was poured in May. Now workers are busy putting up the buildings at this posh and sporty destination.

What will Court Club offer in West Palm Beach?

Court Club incorporates the latest trends in racquet sports, plus health-and-wellness amenities, all in a country club environment, Grace said.

Court Club isn't just about sports, however.

It also will have a luxurious clubhouse, dining establishments, fitness center, spa and swimming pool.

In fact, the Court Club will feature a full roster of athletic, cultural and family events, as well as group fitness.

Who is behind the Court Club?

West Palm Beach-based NDT built [Nora](#), the city's newest district. Shops, offices and restaurants now are open at Nora, a [hotel will open in the fall](#), and [residences are planned, too](#).

NDT also operates the Cove Club, a private club at 4444 N. Flagler Drive in West Palm Beach.

Joining in the club is Nick Coniglio, the Palm Beach operator of Cucina on the island, and [E.R. Bradley's](#) and Lamarina in West Palm Beach.

NDT and Coniglio already are partners in the Cove Club, and they pledge top dining and programming for members.

Grace joined a group already building Court Club on Kirk Road. This group includes New York developer John Lewis, as well as partners Gary Sheinbaum, Danny Sheinbaum, Terry Sanford and Paul Bernon.

Why Court Club backers sees a niche in West Palm Beach

In a March 10 interview, Lewis said he and his partners have been studying the surging growth of companies and residents moving to Palm Beach County.

But growth doesn't just mean new offices. It also means family-friendly activities, Lewis said.

"We want to highlight this idea of time well spent. It's active, wholesome, productive and off-screen," Lewis said. "You can show up, throw away your phone and be there with your friends and family."

While the Cove Club originally was intended to be adults-only, Grace said he agreed there was a need for a family-friendly gathering spot.

The club will feature Court Kids, a family-focused program featuring camps, clinics, supervised play, and youth activities.

Details about West Palm's Court Club

Membership in Court Club isn't inexpensive.

The initiation fee is \$45,000, and annual costs are \$9,500.

The pricetag isn't fazing prospective members, it seems.

"There's a real pent-up demand for this type of club, and it's clearly striking a chord," Keith Spina, the club's architect, said in a statement.

"I haven't gotten this many calls about a project in a long time," added Spina, principal at Spina O'Rourke + Partners in West Palm Beach.

The full Court Club is expected to open by March 1, 2027, although the tennis courts could be open in December.
